Acta Medica Transilvanica journal has adopted the "Uniform Requirements for Manuscripts (URM) submitted to Biomedical Journals" produced by the International Committee of Medical Journals Editors (ICMJE) and encourages the authors to take them into account in elaborating their manuscripts.

Important notice!

Starting with issue 1/2015, the authors will use the template that can be downloaded from the journal site – www.amtsibiu.ro., Send an article section.

- The articles will be exclusively sent by accessing "Send an Article" section on www.amtsibiu.ro. Use the template.
- Only original articles will be accepted, which have never been published elsewhere integrally or partially.
- The articles will be published only after having been submitted to the two stages of the peer-review process http://www.amtsibiu.ro/ro/peer-review process.
- The authors whose articles were rejected following the peer-review process, or which need amendments, will be informed in writing, at the e-mail address mentioned in the moment of submitting the article.
- The articles' registration for publishing will be made after the payment of the subscription or of the additional tax by each author or co-author.
- The translations into the English language must observe the standards of a high quality translation.
- Authors are exclusively liable for the statements made in the text.
- The Editorial Board is entitled to refuse to publish those articles that do not observe the recommendations provided in the "Guidelines for authors" section.

Ethical considerations:

For the prospective, experimental studies, involving human subjects or animals, the consent of the ethics committee of the institution which approved the study will be enclosed.

Regarding the images containing human faces, a black strip will be placed on the eyes of the patient, in order to prevent his/her identification. The name of the patients will be abbreviated with his/her initials.

Authors are encouraged to study the World Medical Association Declaration of Helsinki regarding the ethical principles in all medical research.

Authors are responsible for adhering to guidelines on good publication practice.

Preparing the manuscripts:

The manuscripts will be filled out by using the template.

The articles should comprise 4-5 images, graphics at maximum. These will bear titles and will be numbered according to the text specifications. Images with text, graphics with text or scanned tables will not be accepted.

The tables will be numbered with Arabic numerals on their first appearance in the text and will bear a clear and concise title mentioned above them.

Acronyms will be explained on their first appearance in the text.

General structure of the articles:

1. The manuscript will comprise:

- tile of the article;
- authors' name and institutional affiliation;
- name and contact information of the corresponding author;
- abstract of the article in the English languages;
- keywords in the English languages. For each paper, 3-5 keywords will be selected from the Index Medicus medical subjects or terms used in the manuscript;
- the abstract will not exceed 150 words;
- the abstract must clearly provide the background for the study and should state the study's objectives, methods used, main results and principal conclusions.
- **2.** The contents of the article will not exceed 5 pages for the original articles, 3 pages for reviews. It will include:
 - **Introduction** provide a context or a background of the study. Emphasize the importance of the approached theme; aim, objectives (main and secondary) or the research hypothesis.
 - Materials and Methods this section will describe the research methodology used, the selection method of the studied batches, the plan, the method, the technique and the statistical programme used in data processing and interpretation. Selection of the patients describe the inclusion, exclusion criteria. Authors should explain why people of a particular age or gender have been included in the study.
 - **Results** in this section, the authors will present the results obtained, usually by tables and graphics, accompanied by their interpretation. The results will be presented in a logical sequence. Do not repeat all data in the tables and illustrations in the text. Summarize only the most important observations.

- **Discussions** the new and important aspects of the study will be presented, as well as the interpretation of the personal results within the context of the specialized literature.
- Conclusions the conclusions of the study will be clearly stated, establishing a link between these ones and the purposes of the study.

3. The references list

The reference list is a separate section at the end of the manuscript. References should be numbered consecutively in the order in which they are first mentioned in the text. Identify references in text, tables and legends by Arabic numerals in parentheses. Use exactly the reference style and format as shown below:
